

SUMMER READING PROGRAM

The library staff loves summer and the increased library visits the warm season brings. Each summer, hundreds of young readers return to the library weekly to earn prizes for completed reading logs and to enjoy entertaining and educational programs.

This year's library program, *Build a Better World*, focuses on the many ways reading and actions promote and enhance our community.

Starting Tuesday, June 13th, readers in kindergarten through age 18 may visit the library to register for the summer reading program, make a fun craft, and obtain all the necessary tools to participate.

The summer library program will be separated into three groups; **preschoolers** (ages 3-5 years), **children** (kindergarten- eighth grade), and **tween & teens** (11-18 years old). The preschoolers will meet each Thursday at 10:30 a.m. for their fun program, which includes stories, activities, songs, and prizes for attending. The preschoolers first program is on Thursday, June 8th.

Readers who are signed up for the children's program will meet each Wednesday beginning June 21st. The Wednesday programs will begin promptly at 10:30 a.m. Attendees are strongly encouraged to arrive ten minutes early to obtain

their weekly prizes and find their favorite seats in the meeting room. Wednesday programs are geared for ages 5+ and typically include performers and professional entertainers.



The tween & teen program is on Thursdays at 2:00 p.m. These spectacular, hour-long events are filled with activities and games, crafts, and fun. Participants receive weekly prizes and turn in reading tickets to win grand prizes.

The summer library program lasts six weeks and is sponsored locally by generous community members and businesses. Statewide large corporations and groups, who envision the importance of keeping children reading through the summer months, sponsor this program. A poster displaying all summer reading program sponsors is on display at the library.

CRAFTY EVENTS

The library sponsors crafty events for children and adults. Check the calendar of events and Facebook for program events. Make sure you call ahead and reserve your space if you are interested in making a craft. Sometimes a nominal charge covers material costs and pre-payment is needed. 

PATTI'S SUMMER 2017 PICKS by Patti Cooreman



<u>Shattered Secrets</u> by Karen Harper is the first in a Cold Creek Series that will have you wanting more from the first page until the last. Set in a small town in Ohio Ms. Harper weaves a tale of mystery and suspense centered round Theresa Lockwood's return to her hometown following a death in her family after many years being gone. Most residents are happy to see her, others not so because with her return once again young children go missing. As a child, Theresa was an abduction victim yet she escaped with no memory of that horrific experience.

Other children abducted during that same time were never found. Could that same scenario be making its way back to Cold Creek? It's a good whodunit read that also adds a bit of romance between Theresa and the town's sheriff, Gabe McCord.

<u>The Woman on the Orient Express</u> by Lindsay Jayne Ashford is a fascinating journey on a train that brings to life a world far away both in time and place. The author chose to write an historical fiction using real and made up people of what may have happened on the train ride Agatha Christie actually took to Baghdad on the Orient Express following her divorce in 1928. Rather than a murder mystery, it is a book driven by secrets held by three unacquainted women and how they come together to form a perma-



nent bond. Agatha Christie is hiding her identity, another is unable to conceive, and the other is pregnant. One's secret may be the ruin of another's life and the other woman's secret could forever change her own life if it is disclosed. I loved the suspense of finding out what secrets these women held and how it all worked out; but, I also enjoyed the train ride itself as it traveled to places I will never go. Descriptions of people, places, customs, food and travel used by the Turks and Iraqis during this time were detailed and vibrant. In the end, the author reminds us of Agatha Christie's own words when she was at her lowest: "for the train, like life,

must go on until it reaches its destination. You might not always like what you see out of the window, but if you pull down the blind, you will miss the beauty as well as the ugliness. The train must go on, trust the train."



The Keeper of Lost Things by Ruth Hogan in some ways reminded me of Sarah Addison Allen's *Garden Spells*. It is an enchanting light read about a gentleman who has over the years collected items dropped, misplaced, or just left behind that he has meticulously catalogued. His intentions are faithful: to return the items to their rightful owners. He leaves this monumental task to his unsuspecting housekeeper Laura because his time has run out. He also leaves his whimsical home and all his possessions to her. Did I mention the house

comes with a resident ghost, and a handsome gardener? Lots of fun characters and happenstance fill this book I may reread just because!



Last Days of Night by Graham Moore is a masterpiece of historical fiction that takes you into the offices, boardrooms and lives of three of the most influential people of modern times: George Westinghouse, Thomas Edison, and Nikola Tesla as told through the eyes of a young Columbia Law School lawyer, Paul Cravath. The story centers on the lawsuit between George Westinghouse and Thomas Edison: who invented the light bulb and who holds the right to power the country? What a thriller Graham Moore has here! I couldn't put it down as I

was fascinated by the behind-the-scenes workings of these marvelous inventors and what really drove them.
