Children's Sensory Table



The popular sensory table was purchased with a Public Library Services Grant from the Insti-Museum and Library tute of Museum and Library Services.

A sensory table is full of materials that get children to use all five senses. Children benefit from table play as it helps to develop fine motor skills, cognitive skills, language skills, and creativity. Rice, Play Dough, Pom Poms, Water Beads, Magnetic Tiles, Wooden Puzzles, Measuring Cups, Scoops, Stacking Games, Tweezers, Buckets, Shovels, and Rakes are all materials purchased



with the grant for use with the sensory table. In addition, Musgrove Grains donated soybeans for children to use.

More Hotspots!

The Library has signed a new one-year contract with Sprint and now has four mobile hotspots available for check-out. A mobile hotspot taps into a cellular network just like a smart phone does. Once connected the hotspot can share that connection via WiFi with nearby laptops, tablets, and anything that can connect to a WiFi network. A \$10 refundable deposit is required at check-out. Check-out is limited to one week.

Updated App for 24/7 Magazine & Audiobook Access

We are excited to introduce a new way to download magazines and audiobooks. The new reader provides an enhanced user experience through improved ease of use and readability. You will need to download the new application to enjoy the new features.

New Look and Feel—A fresh new look and feel enhances the user experience and makes it easier to navigate the app. For example, now you can access the content menu from the navigation bar.



- **Text to Speech***—For the first time, RBdigital users can listen to all articles in audio format, which improves reading comprehension and allows you to listen to the article while doing other things. *Available for iOS only.
- New Color Themes—In addition to the current light and dark themes, the new reader adds sepia and grey to improve readability of text and reduce eye fatigue.
- Scalable Font and Screen Brightness Controls—Instead of an action sheet selector, the new reader uses a slider control for finer grain control over the font size and screen brightness.



Patti's Fall Picks

Book Recommendations by Patti Cooreman

<u>The Lighthouse Keeper's Daughter</u> by Hazel Gaynor: The historical fiction's prologue opens in 1938 and apprises us of Matilda, a disgraced pregnant nineteen-year-old who is about to board a ship from Ireland bound for America where a distant cousin resides. She is being escorted by her mother

and a chaperone, Mrs. O'Driscoll. We then go back in time to 1838 and Grace Darling, a lighthouse keeper's twenty-two year old daughter who lived with her family and helped her father at Longstone Lighthouse on the Farne Islands, Northumberland, England. Hazel Gaynor intertwines history and a tale together to celebrate two women's fortitude, bravery and stern independence in the face of grave danger. "They call me a heroine, but I am not deserving of such accolades. I am just an ordinary woman who did her duty." On September 6, 1838, during a tremendous storm, Grace Darling's mother counsels that storms are to be respected, never feared. "If you show it you're afraid, you're halfway dead". Grace spots shipwreck survivors during her watch and



The Turn of the Key by Ruth Ware: I have to admit, I am a fan of Ruth Ware and her writing style.

She had me at the edge of my seat with The Woman in Cabin 10, and, The Death of Mrs.

Westway had me turning the pages so fast they nearly ripped! The Turn of the Key is just as thrilling. Rowan Caine has found herself sitting in a prison cell having been accused of murdering an eight-year-old girl when she was her namy. As Rowan writes to a lawyer

murdering an eight-year-old girl when she was her nanny. As Rowan writes to a lawyer claiming her innocence, and the reader is left to follow along as she lays out what happened. It all began when Rowan answered a peculiar advertisement for a live-in nanny with a starting annual salary of an astounding ~L55,000, use of a car, and eight weeks off yearly! She will reside in the beautiful Scottish Highlands in a "smart" home owned and

designed by the Elincourts, both architects, with four children, a housekeeper and a handyman. Sounds perfect, right? No, it's creepy and Rowan has to fight the feeling there are ghosts about. We all know, things are not always as they seem. This is Ruth Ware at her best!

The House on Sugar Plum Lane by Judy Duarte: Although this is Book #3 in her Fairbrook series, I chose to give it a try because I needed a happy, easy-to-read book and it had good reviews. Amy Masterson has chosen to separate from her attorney husband Brandon and move to a rented three story Victorian home on Sugar Plum Lane with her preschooler daughter Callie. Amy had researched the home and found it was owned by Eleanor Rucker, the same woman who had given up Amy's mother for adoption in 1966. Amy continued searching for her grandmother after her mother passed away from breast cancer. The story takes a somewhat pretty predictable path with

it was worth reading.

some surprises along the way, but I guarantee it is a heartwarming book you won't want to end.

Melville Heighte, the setting for Watching You, is a very nice neighborhood in Bristol, England that is home to doctors and lawyers and old-money academics. You wouldn't envision someone in this neighborhood being brutally murdered in their own kitchen. But everyone in Melville Heights has a secret. And everyone is watching each other. I caution you to refrain from jumping to conclusions in this galvanizing page turner because nothing is as it seems. As a young girl growing up where houses were side by side, everyone seemed to be watching each other. Doesn't everybody? Maybe out of curiosity or boredom? I guess that's why I picked Watching You off the shelf. And
