#### **Need Help?**

There are many ways for card holders to access library materials through several applications. And, if you are a non-resident card holder, you too can now

upgrade your card by paying \$25 quarterly, or \$100 yearly for electronic access to Libby (e-books, e-magazines, & audiobooks); Hoopla (e-books, audiobooks, movies, music; & tv shows); and Ancestry.com (library edition).

Technology is helpful but it can also bring on frustration. Library staff can help you to set up your electronic access and show you how to check your account, place holds, renew items, search for titles, download books and access other resources. An appointment is required. Call 616.374.4591 to set up your appointment.

**Libby** is a free app where you can borrow e-books, digital audiobooks, and magazines. You can stream titles with Wi-Fi or mobile data, or download them for offline use and read anytime, anywhere. 

Anne-Marie Flannery recommends the following books to our Friends newsletter readers:



Lucy Foley's *The Hunting Party* is a character study and thriller wrapped in a mystery. A group of thirty something friends gather at a Scottish estate to welcome the New Year. Originally supposed to be a relaxing and fun weekend, the group is soon unnerved by the both the stark landscape and long buried resentments that surface among the friends. Within days, one person is dead and another member of the group is a murderer. Foley does an excellent job asking the questions, how well do we really know our friends, and can loyalties shift to accommodate nothing more than the passage of years? (Book, Hoopla, Audiobook CD)

The mother/daughter relationship; genetic bonds; generational trauma—these are the themes explored in Ashley Audrain's new novel *The Push*. When new mother Blythe fails to feel love for her newborn daughter Violet, her maternal guilt is extreme. Violet's behavior toward her seems oddly detached and cold. Worse, she may be deadly to those around her. When son Sam joins the family, dynamics shift and loyalties change. Blythe's story is interspersed with the stories of her mother and grandmother, both women overwhelmed and ill-equipped to deal with motherhood. Audrain's second person narration can be jarring but her prose



shines when showcasing Blythe's rich interior monologue. This novel asks the questions, is Blythe an incompetent figure, continuing the familial trait of poor mothering, or is Violet something even worse? (Downloadable E-book)



Jeanine Cummins took the literary world by storm in 2020 with her best-selling book *American Dirt.* Few people however have read her earlier non-fiction release, *A Rip in Heaven: A Memoir of Murder and Its Aftermath.* In April 1991, Cummins older brother, Tom and his two female cousins were assaulted on the Old Chain of Rocks Bridge just outside of St. Louis Missouri. Tom survived, the cousins (who were sisters) did not. This book tracks the aftermath of the murders and how Tom (as the sole survivor) was considered the prime suspect. Cummins' family pushed desperately for the real assailants to be found while Tom underwent a grief-stricken odyssey trying to prove his innocence. Cummins deftly records the horror her family felt

while turning an objective eye to the murder investigation and the killers themselves. (Hoopla)
