#### Need to Send a Fax or Make a Copy?

#### Library QR Code

What's a QR code and how do I use it? A QR code works similar to a barcode. It is a machine-scannable image that can be instantly read using a smartphone, tablet, or computer camera. Every QR code consists of a number of black squares and dots which represent certain pieces of information. When you scan the Library QR code on your device, it lets you easily access the Library website (lakeodessalibrary.org).

#### How Do I Get a Library Card?

In accordance with Lakeland Library Cooperative policy, our Library requires the following identification to verify residence: a current Michigan Driver License or Identification Card, or other picture identification with current address. Alternative verifications with current address accepted include a voter registration card, utility bill, health insurance card, automobile registration, or printed checks. Parents or guardians need to apply for library cards for minors.

Non–Odessa Township residents may also obtain a card. Residents of other communities that are part of the Lakeland Library Cooperative must have a card from their local library first. Those libraries are listed at llcoop.org. Others can obtain a special non-resident card but must pay if they want access to electronic collections.

## Accessing the Library from Home

Options for Electronic Access to Digital Collections

Where do I start? Although there are many ways to start your search, a good starting option is to look for the co-op logo and download that app to your phone, tablet, or computer. Log in with the name "Lake Odessa Community Library," your library barcode and PIN. If you need a PIN, come in or call the Library. Check your account, place holds, renew items, and search for titles across platforms. Using your device camera, scan the barcode of your items and check out the materials without ever stopping at the library's



front desk.



**Libby**: OverDrive discontinued support for the OverDrive app on February 23, 2022, as it focuses users on Libby online and the Libby app for Apple (iOS) and Android smart phones and tablets. Libby is a free app where you can borrow e-books, digital audiobooks, and magazines. You can stream titles with Wi-Fi or mobile data, or download them for offline use and read anytime, anywhere. A major change in Libby is that

you can now borrow and place holds on the same title at different libraries. When doing so, the icon next to the title (known as a gem) updates its colors to reflect which of your libraries you've borrowed or placed the title on hold from. The Lakeland Library Co-op has partnered with four other libraries to share digital collections. This change means more e-books and audiobooks for you! To add these other libraries:

- 1. Tap the Libby menu icon.
- 2. Tap "Add Library."
- 3. Search and add Midwest Collaborative for Library Services, Suburban Library Cooperative, Great Lakes Digital Libraries, and Download Destination.
- 4. If prompted, enter your library card number.
- 5. Browse the library collection and choose a title to check out.
- 6. Enjoy your e-book, e-magazine, or audiobook!

**MI-83 Digital Library Connection:** Every Library in Michigan is eligible to select Digital Content at no cost through this program. The Lakeland Library Cooperative is pleased to announce that the "MI-83 Digital Library Connection" will be used to support the priorities of the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA) by providing all Michigan public libraries with equitable, in-perpetuity access to digital content in e-book and audiobook format. Funding is provided in part by the Institute of Museum & Library Services through the Library of Michigan.

Project partners include the Michigan Library Cooperatives and the Michigan Library Association This grant will provide digital content to individual libraries, Shared Content Groups, and libraries that have never been able to offer digital content to their communities—enabling all Michigan residents to benefit from these federal funds. Every legally established Michigan public library is eligible for digital content, even those that do not qualify for state aid. In keeping with the federal legislative priorities, digital content topics include mental health, workforce development, job seeking skills, health, and general educational needs with a focus on nonfiction titles to enhance current collections and create new ones. Library Director, Jennifer Salgat, added 35 e-books and 23 audiobooks to our library's collection through this grant.







Book Reviews from Friends & Friends of Friends & Others




PARENTS! GRANDPARENTS! TEACHERS! Deanna Humphrey says *Thrivers, The* Surprising Reasons Why Some Kids Struggle and Others Shine by Michele Borba is a must read. How to help children be thrivers not strivers. It's not grades it's character! The author lists seven character traits and then explains how to build them in every child. A wealth of helpful, guiding information to help adults help children. (Book, ebook)

Anne-Marie Flannery recommends the next three books:

Catherynne Valente's novel Comfort Me With Apples provides a mystery mixed in historical myth. The story is told from the viewpoint of a woman living in an idyllic community, who comes to discover her life is not so perfect after all. Valente's talent lies in allowing the secret of the book to unfurl slowly and the reader to come to the truth of it on their own. (Audiobook, Hoopla)






Francisco Cantu worked for four years as border patrol agent in El Paso, Texas before leaving the job to pursue a literary degree. He details his experiences in the memoir *The Line Becomes a River*. Cantu, also of Hispanic heritage, feels torn between doing his duty as an agent and sympathizing with the people risking their lives to arrive in America. The stakes are raised further when a friend of his is deported and Cantu works to reunite him with family in Texas. This book deftly de-

scribes the humanity and desperation of both the patrol agents and the migrants. The reader is left with the realization that all along the border in this country, the struggle continues. (e-book)

The Only Good Indians by Stephen Graham Jones is a book that includes both horror and social commentary. In their youth, four American Indian friends were involved in a morally questionable act, the reverberations of which would haunt them years later. An unearthly entity begins to stalk the men, seeking revenge. Graham Jones weaves issues of terror, regret, and the traditional folklore of Native Americans to showcase how selfish actions often result in a quest for justice by the aggrieved party. Libby's Literary Corner for Adults recommends: *Honor*, by Thrity Umrigar, Smita, Indian American journalist, is back in India to help a friend, covering a story of family honor and sibling perfidy. She didn't leave India by choice and vowed never to return, but there she is, immersed in the heart-wrenching life of Meena, a young widow and mother. As hard as she tries to avoid getting emotionally involved, Smita finds herself drawn into the tragedy and hope of Meena, the culture of old India, still very much alive, and the vibrancy of modern India. Fighting for the rights of one wronged woman of poverty

might just cost Smita more than she's prepared to give. It doesn't help that her chauffeur and host, Mohan, is, himself, conflicted between the India of his privilege and the one Smita experienced so long ago that forced her family to leave. Oh, how life becomes complicated when a journalist's story becomes personal. What a beautiful, beautiful story! (Book)
