

Board decided to turn the back storage room into a quiet space. Construction on this space is almost complete. The Lakewood Area Lions Club donated \$300 toward the project as they



Add a library on the Libby App: Find collections on the Overdrive website: 1. Tap the Libby menu icon in the top right corner. From lakeland.overdrive.com, click 2. Tap the "Add a Library" option from on the "Partner Libraries" tab near the menu. the top right corner and take your pick from Midwest Collaborative for 3.Search for Midwest Collaborative Library Services, or Suburban Lior Suburban Library Cooperative. brary Cooperative. 4.Browse the library collection and choose a title you want to check out.

- 5.If prompted, enter your library card number.
- 6.Enjoy your e-book or audiobook.

No Worries, It's Renewed!

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Starting January 1, 2020, auto-renewal is now for **all** patrons (residents of Odessa township as well as non-residents) and the ability to renew online. Please remember auto-renewal does not apply for DVDs, mobile hotspots, Ozobots, magazines, and digital content. Books will automatically be renewed for an additional three weeks from the original due date. This new feature allows two automatic renewals. Reminder notices will be sent three days before items are due.

Patti's Winter Picks

Book Recommendations by Patti Cooreman & Friends



Careful What You Wish For by Hallie Ephron is about a professional organizer who helps people declutter their lives. Her name is Emily Harlow. She's married to Frank, a lawyer with a hobby of attending yard sales and collecting finds that verges on hoarding! Emily has two clients, Mrs. Murphy who wants Emily to clear out a storage unit her late husband had rented out. The unit is full of old books, maps, and memorabilia but due to the failure of the storage unit's climate control, the items could be damaged beyond repair. The second client, is Quinn Newell. She wants Emily to clear out her garage. Sounds pretty straight forward, right? Well, it's not! Thanks to a bit of girl-chat about disgruntled marriages, fueled by one too many

glasses of Prosecco and not trusting ones instincts, Emily keeps on getting in deeper and deeper in a mess. Soon she finds herself a possible suspect in a coverup of a murder. I enjoyed this book mostly because I empathize with Emily. I am married to a man who can't drive past a yard sale without stopping, and I like a good mystery.

Mary Flannery recommends **Shamed by Linda Castillo**, a well-written, stand alone book that is easy to read. Prepare to be hooked right away if you like suspenseful fiction. **Shamed**, the eleventh Kate Burkholder novel, opens with the murder of a well-respected Amish grandmother and the kidnapping of her 7-year-old granddaughter. Kate who is the chief of police in peaceful Painters Mill, Ohio, directs the investigation of her team into this brutal murder and kidnapping. As the investigation gets deeper into the crime, Kate and her team dig up the past of a tortured Amish family. Chief Burkholder, who herself is a former Amish member, knows both the inter-workings of the Amish and the English. Award-winning author Castillo is known for her accurate portrayal of the Amish and small town police procedure.

Recommendations from Libby Kinsey: The first is **Nanaville by Anna Quindlen**: Here's my raw honest truth. The recent country music documentary series on PBS took a toll on my husband Jim, moving him to tears and leaving him somewhat melancholy. **Nanaville** by Anna Quindlen did the same for me! Grandparenting has been one of the "grandest" experiences of my life. Quindlen is just beginning that journey. Her insights, humor, self-scolding, absolute delight and personal growth speak to me as my heavily-highlighted e-book copy proves. This is MY story (except for the parts that are uniquely hers, of course). Quindlen has such a way with words and metaphors! Being a grandparent is wonderful because there aren't all the ex-




with words and metaphors! Being a grandparent is wonderful because there aren't all the expectations, no parent performance demands in order to raise children to be good people (Job well done, by the way Libby!). On the downside, there's the humbling reality of not being in the lead or even in supporting roles of raising children; we're more like those minor credits mentioned at the end of the movie. We're not the main course, nor even side dishes. We're DESSERT! Now dessert isn't really necessary, but who doesn't love it? Stepping back to watch your kids as they parent, being in awe at how well they do. Boy, can I relate! By the end of the book, Anna Quindlen is preparing to welcome her second grandchild, a girl, into the family, and she knows experience number two will not be the same as number one, but every bit as amazing.



Miracle Creek by Angie Kim is also recommended by Libby as one she could not stop reading. What an amazing story about the lengths some might go to move their kids toward normalcy, to heal what is broken, the stories we tell that are far from the truth, but can be made to sound like the Gospel, the length we will go to protect those we love, and the intricacies and challenges of every day living with children who have special needs. This is a court case, a trial of a mother accused of causing her son's death and the death of another mother by lighting a fire. This page-turner is told in several voices through the four-day trial. Pak, Young, and Mary are the Korean family who ran the facility and who stand to gain 1.3 million dollars in in-

surance money. Matt and Janine are a couple who suffered great personal loss in the fire, and their already rocky marriage spirals even faster when painful truths are revealed. Then there's Elizabeth, the one on trial for murder, the model aggressive mother and advocate whose young Henry paid the ultimate price, his life. Did she really say she wished he were dead and that no one liked him? Is she the only single mother of a special-needs child who has ever lamented her fate or stooped in frustration to shameful behavior? Okay, certainly not mother-of-the-year material, BUT DID SHE SET THE FIRE? Who else might have had motive and opportunity? How will this mystery unravel, and how many lives will be ruined before the full truth is uncovered? Oh, WOW. Just, OH, WOW!!! Best book in awhile. I think it's a perfect book club find, so much fodder for conversation AND riveting to boot!

Below is a review of this book done by Friends of the Library Director, Patti Cooreman.

The Giver of Stars is set in the mountains of rural Kentucky and is based on Eleanor Roosevelt's Pack Horse Library Initiative, a bookmobile of sorts that was designed to aid women and children in the hard hit coal country during the Great Depression. The Packhorse Librarians of Kentucky were real people, and their stories are riveting. JoJo Moyes has woven an extraordinary historical fiction account of five women as close to nonfiction as can be to help us become familiar with and appreciate their contributions. We are first introduced to Alice Wright, a new bride from England, whose husband and father-in-law run one of the coal mines. Alice felt suffocated by her British family and quickly realized she would fare no better in rural Kentucky being newly married to a man who actually loves someone else and a clueless overbearing father-in-law. Without support, she volunteers during the first call for a traveling librarian. She meets and soon has an ally in the leader of the pack, Margery, a single, self-sufficient and smart woman who has never asked a man's permission for anything. Margery and Alice along with three other heroic women face unforgettable challenges of loyalty, dangers, compassion while refusing to be intimidated by men or protocol. The landscape is written in full technicolor. Both beautiful and utterly frightening. Despite everything, these women never disappoint because they are 100% committed to bringing people books that will change their lives. I laughed and I cried all throughout my Kentucky journey, as I know you will as well.
